

The OBITS

Many of you may have heard of these deaths already. These notices are included here in brief but more details are to be had on the P.W.A.S. website. As our secretary-treasurer puts it so well, "Our warden service family has had a rough trail to follow these past months.

Geraldine Kraft

Geraldine, passed away on February 27, 2018 at the age of 90 years. She was the wife of warden Fred Kraft who worked in Banff and Glacier and other national parks. They retired to Sundre. Fred passed away sevral years earlier.

Cynthia Ball

Cynthia was Mike Wesbrook's partner. She passed away May 8th, 2018. A Celebration of her Life was held in Jasper.

Dennis Welsh

Husband of Theresa, he passed away June 14, 2018. Dennis worked his way up to the Jasper Barn Boss in his 36 years of service. He also ran the Jasper Park Lodge stables. His memorial service was held in Rocky Mt'n. House.

Lance Derek Cooper

Lance passed away in the Canmore Hospital November, 2018. Lance joined the Warden Service in 1971 and became one of the pioneers of the Mountain Rescue team. In 1981, he left and became a pilot for the Mountain Rescue Team.

Lance was awarded the Search and Rescue Award of Canada in 1988, The Alberta Emergency Services Medal in 2009, and Association of Canadian Mountain Guides Award in 2013.

Helen Dawson

Helen passed away Jan. 2008 at age 97. She and husband Murray lived in the W.

National parks where they raised their family and enjoyed the outdoor life. Murray became Chief of Visitor Services in Banff.

Alfie Burstrom

Alfie suffered a stroke and passed away in the McBride Hospital on Nov. 29, 2018, age 86. His wife June had died earlier that year.

He joined the warden service in 1953 and went on to become the first national park dog master. He and June retired to Valemont in 1987.

llse Wackerle

Ilse Wackerle passed away in the Sundre Hospital December 10, 2018 at the age of 86. Ilse came to Canada in 1956 from Germany and married John Wackerle, long time Banff Warden.

Phylllis Dumpleton

Phyllis had passed away on January 26 2019 of cancer. She and Don were married for 61 years. They moved to B.C. after Don retired from Parks Canada. Her ashes were spread at a favorite spot in White Rock.

Wayne Thordason

Wayne has passed away from pancreatic cancer. His dad was Tom Thordarson who was assistant CPW in Banff at one time and Wayne was a seasonal warden in Banff in the early 70's and then became a full time warden in Jasper for a decade or so. He quit the Warden Service to go ranching and eventually ended up as a Corrections Officer in Lethbridge and resided at Coaldale.

This National Geographic photo was taken on one of the Marqusesas Islands which are found about halfway between Lima, Peru and the N. tip of Australia. Horses were first introduced to Ua Huka by French Admiral Abel Dupetit-Thouars. The

islanders tamed them and used them for riding, hunting and packing and now for dude rides too. Horses still run wild on Ua Huka and some islanders still capture and tame them.

If this is the kind of life that still appeals to you and you are looking for some place warm to retire to, the Marquesas would be a good place especially if you took French Language training. Or, even for a winter get-away: there are resorts where English is spoken on some of the Islands.
