

Plans are moving ahead for all Warden Alumni, including relatives, friends, hangers-on and assorted others to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the Ranch next September. The celebration as presently planned is to be a simple one - the unveiling of a plaque near the ranch house commemorating the ranch's long history. The ceremony is planned for early in September, shortly after the long weekend. We will let you know the date as soon as it has been decided. In the meantime, make a note on your calendars.

This time was chosen as we expect the campground to be less busy then. The heart of this celebration is to be a warden get-together in the campground. So plan accordingly. Those a little too



old and creaky for camping out should book a hotel nearby although “nearby” is not all that close. Depending on the weather, you might want to trailer your horses and do some riding in this magnificent country.

The executive is certainly glad to have got started early on planning this event. The plaque has been manufactured and is in our possession. It is heavy, was expensive and is paid for. Plans are well along for getting a monument-sized boulder to the ranch to mount it on. As well, there is a book on the history of the Ranch in the works. We have applied for a grant from the AB. Gov’t. but it is part grant and part lottery: We won’t know if we are getting a grant or how much until after the book is published! Kathy Calvert has worked hard on the text and several executive members on the selection of photos. It has a publisher - Rocky Mountain Books. The book will be well illustrated and replete - that is, jammed full of - stories.

The Wardens, the band, plans to be present with their latest CD. They might even do a little entertaining if they are not worn out from their tours! Bring your musical instruments and join in.

At the present we know of no plans or financial commitments by Parks Canada to celebrate this anniversary. You know how government works; a lot depends on budget allocations and nods from above so that could change. We, the executive, would like it to not be at the eleventh hour! They are permitting us to install the plaque on ranch property and have approved the wording and the French translation. Rick Smith, the ranch manager, is very enthusiastic and co-operative and that promises to help make this a successful event. Attendees can get a tour of the ranch by ranch staff, and the low-down on its present operation. The tour includes the on-site museum started by Marie Nylund and kept up since.



A Few of Our Members’ Summer Adventures



Books and Films of Possible Interest.

Derek Tilson sent out the following 'book review' of *The Last Season* authored by Eric Blehm. A highly enjoyable read, especially for those who have been in the business.

Leanne Minton's book Blue Creek Bride, A Kiwi rides into the Rockies with her warden husband has been successful. Watch for the January edition of "Our Canada" magazine for a feature article on Blue Creek Bride. Leanne is currently working on her second book, Brazeau Bound, which will be published in the near future.

Perry's recommends the movie "Un-Branded." It is about four young men fresh out of University who decide to take a horseback trip from the Mexican to the Canadian border. That's not all: they grew up around horses and know what they are doing - definitely not greenhorns - and they "adopt" ten mustangs from the Bureau of Land Management which is dealing with a horse problem to our elk issue only on a much larger scale in terms of both numbers and costs. The movie gets into that issue too in a balanced manner. It is well filmed and in a way that gives it some feature movie flavour - the guys like to have some fun along the way. The trip takes four months but avoids becoming tedious. I am sure you will enjoy watching it.

On the Environmental Front.

CPAWS Petition to Establish a Buffer Zone around Gros Morne:

As a new year dawns, we are hopeful that 2016 will be the year our federal and provincial governments finally create a buffer zone around Gros Morne National Park to safeguard this amazing World Heritage Site from harmful industrial development threats. As you may recall, in 2013 a proposal to drill and "frack" for oil metres from the boundary of Gros Morne National Park raised serious concern that Gros Morne National Park, its World Heritage status, and the local tourism and fishing economy are at risk from potential adjacent industrial development. Since then, we've been working hard, alongside local community members, to encourage the federal and provincial governments to create a permanent buffer zone around the park. This idea is now supported by local and provincial tourism interests, prominent Canadians and the UNESCO World Heritage Committee which, in 2014, recommended that Canada establish a buffer zone around the park.

The Standing Committee on the Environment and Sustainable Development

This ten member committee, made up of Liberals, Conservatives and one NDP member is chaired by Deborah Schulte. It studies the programs and legislation of Environment Canada, Parks Canada and the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency as well as reports of the Commissioner of the Environment and Sustainable Development.

Members of the committee were in the Western Parks this fall: Banff, Jasper, Waterton and possibly others. They certainly heard about both sides (or more) of the Skywalk, The Lake Louise Ski Hill and the Maligne Lake accommodation issues and others. Their report was submitted to the government. The editor kept being send around in circles trying to get to the report itself to get the gist of it for inclusion here.

Matters presently being dealt with by the committee include:



1. Federal Protected Areas and Conservation Objectives

2. Bill C-18, An Act to amend the Rouge National Urban Park Act, the Parks Canada Agency Act and the Canada National Parks Act

3. A Review of The Canadian Environmental Protection Act, 1999

This is a committee whose work those of you with an ongoing interest in national environmental issues might want to keep an eye on and also submit briefs when they request them.


