"Historic investment" in Federal Budget 2018

OTTAWA, ONTARIO – In its 2018 budget the federal government set aside \$1.3 billion dollars of new federal funding over five years was to protect Canada's land, ocean, and wildlife. This is going to support Canada's efforts to achieve its commitment to protect at least 17% of our land and 10% of our ocean by 2020. It was the first time, the federal government allocated funding for action on nature conservation as well as to support conservation efforts by Indigenous governments, provinces, territories, and other partners.

This cost-shared model is similar to the approach used to deliver on other shared priorities in Canada such as infrastructure, climate change mitigation, and health care.

Some Highlights:

- \$500 million over five years for a new \$1 Billion "Nature Fund" to support conservation partnerships and which will leverage funding from other government and non-governmental sources;
- \$800 million over five years to support:
 - New federal protected areas
 - Increased capacity for national park management
 - Increased capacity to protect species at risk
 - Funding to establish a coordinated network of conservation areas working with provincial,



territorial and Indigenous partners.

And Not So Right;

March 14, 2018: Canada Failing Wood Buffalo N. P.

The situation facing Canada's largest National Park is dire. In 2017, experts from the World Heritage Centre and the International Union for the Conservation of Nature concluded that impacts on the park from development are "far more complex and severe than previously thought." Since then Wood Buffalo National Park was determined "to have the worst conservation outlook for a Natural

World Heritage Site in Canada and is in danger of being put on the List of World Heritage in Danger."

"When our community heard Minister McKenna tell us that the mission report was a 'call to action', we were hopeful," said Melody Lepine, Director of Government and Industry Relations at Mikisew Cree First Nation. "A year later, there is little concrete action to report"

"the World Heritage Committee is expecting Canada to deliver more than a 'plan to plan'", said Alison Ronson, CPAWS National Director, Parks Program. "With the commitments for environmental conservation in the new federal budget, Canada can and must develop an action plan with real resources."

"Canada's ongoing refusal to consider the impacts of the Site C dam on the Peace Athabasca Delta is astounding," said Galen Armstrong, Peace Valley Campaigner at Sierra Club BC. "This is Canada's largest National Park, but provincial and federal governments are still letting it fall through the cracks." Canada now has less than eight months to develop an Action Plan to present to the World Heritage Committee.

Harold passed away at the Bonne Bay Health Centre in Norris Pt, NL, on Thursday, May 2nd, 2019 at the age of 81 years.

Harold joined the Canadian Army forces, in the Signal's Corps in July 24th, 1958 and became a Sergeant and went on many UN Peace Keeping Missions till he retired in October 7th, 1978, and then he became a Park Warden with Gros Morne Park, in Rocky Hr, NL.

In lieu of flowers donations made to The Royal Canadian Legion Poppy Fund,in Harold's memory would be gratefully appreciated by the family.

Stephen Frank Peter Kun March 15, 1931 -- February 27, 2019.

Steve was born in Drumheller, Alberta and attended school there. He enrolled in the Faculty of Forestry at the University of British Columbia in 1950, graduating with a Master's degree in 1958.

His thirty-year career with Parks Canada began as Assistant Warden in Banff National Park in the summer of 1951. With time taken for education he moved through the ranks serving as Western Regional Forester in Jasper, Assistant to the Western Regional Director in Calgary and Banff, Superintendent of Prince Albert National Park, Chief of National Parks in Ottawa for policy and planning, Superintendent of Banff National Park, back to Ottawa to work on developing new national parks, and finally to Calgary as Director General of the Western Region. During his career he visited every national park and historic site in Canada and travelled internationally



representing Canada in conservation work. He loved traveling by horseback through the Rocky Mountains and came to know the backcountry well and the wardens who worked there.

After his retirement in 1988, Steve embarked on a new career ranching in the foothills of Alberta and raised pedigreed Canadian Pinto horses. He and Gail built a beautiful place that was enjoyed by his family and friends for 30 years. In 2017 Steve and Gail moved to Cochrane to live in a retirement community where they made many new friends. In 2019 they moved to Wakefield Quebec to be closer to their family and to live in the province they had enjoyed so much canoeing and on skis. At Steven's request there will be no funeral. Books of Interest to Our Members


Ya Ha Tinda: A Home Place by Kathy Calvert.
